### Foreword from councillor, Christine Taylor

I'd love to share some of the latest news with you all in this fabulous publication, which is back by popular demand.

#### Market Square update

In the Market Square, the four new shops and six apartments are scheduled for completion in February 2025. Although there is no more funding available to do anything else right now. Keith Fitzsimmons is standing by with his project to build a hydrotherapy pool. Although this is a private business, not only would this bring jobs into the town centre and much-needed visitors to Bedlington, but our children would be able to have their swimming lessons within the centre of Bedlington and not have to travel to other towns. Now, wouldn't that be something.

#### New cycle link

The cycle link is in full swing, too. I hope as many of you who wanted to, either came along to our consultation day in Bedlington Community Centre or had an opportunity to have your say at the library. You can find out more about the project on page 13.

#### New train line

The new train line at Bedlington Station is scheduled to open in 2025 – see page 15 for more information.

#### New data centre

World-leading organisation, QTS, is planning to create a data centre campus at Cambois which will bring employment opportunities, both during the construction of the facility and its ongoing operation. See page 14 for more details.

#### £3m funding for Bedlington

I have been part of the Borderlands team for three years. The team works across Northumberland County Council, Cumberland Council, Dumfries and Galloway Council, Scottish Borders Council, and Westmorland and Furness Council.

The Borderlands team is responsible for supporting and overseeing the ten-year £450m Borderlands Inclusive Growth Deal. As part of this, funding worth three million pounds is to be shared between both east and west Bedlington. Through this investment, it is hoped to enable businesses to thrive, improve productivity, attract new residents and welcome more visitors to enjoy the beautiful natural environment of our vibrant region.

#### New planters, bins and seating

While bigger projects are ongoing, here at the Town Council we have our own responsibilities and have plans for 2025 to remove the old, damaged planters in the town with new, bespoke floral planters at strategic points along the length of the Front Street. We are also undertaking a refresh of all of our seats, some of which are long overdue, and we have replaced a number of litter bins for larger more economical bins. We also regularly check our play parks and undertake all repairs to ensure they are safe for our children to play in.

#### Remembrance

I'm incredibly proud of our Remembrance service which we have built up over the last ten years from a small gathering to around 2,000 people. With representation from our schools as well as the armed forces both in and out of uniform, I feel it's important to honour those who sacrificed their lives, so we could live ours.

And finally, as we approach the season of goodwill, we at West Bedlington Town Council would like to wish you all a very merry Christmas and a healthy, happy new year.

# Life savers, on your doorstep

In Bedlington, we are fortunate to have six public-access defibrillators and an additional one at Bedlington Community Centre which is only accessible when the centre is open.

A defibrillator is a device that gives a high-energy electric shock to the heart through the chest wall to someone who is in cardiac arrest. This high-energy shock is called defibrillation and it's an essential life-saving step in the chain of survival.

If you come across someone who has had a cardiac arrest, it's vital to call 999, and if you are able to start CPR\*, you should find out if there is a defibrillator close by.

These defibrillators are often known as public-access defibrillators, as anyone can use them in an emergency. You shouldn't be afraid of using a defibrillator if someone has had a cardiac arrest. They are amazing pieces of equipment that give simple voice commands which make them really easy for anyone to use.

It's nearly ten years since our very first public-access defibrillators were installed, thanks to the generosity of Synergy Healthcare and Bedlington Masonic Hall. As these two defibrillators approach the end of their working life, West Bedlington Town Council has arranged to replace both the defibrillators and the new cabinets in which they are housed.

#### A heartfelt thanks to our guardians

West Bedlington Town Council would like to take this opportunity to thank our defibrillator guardians - Keith Morris, Vida Morris and Lucie Archbold - for their ongoing help. Without the support of loyal guardians, many public-access defibrillator sites and initiatives would not be possible to operate.

A guardian carries out regular, simple cabinet and defibrillator inspections which are completed and returned to the Ambulance Service via the Town Council's office to determine whether a defibrillator is operational. It's possible to have more than one guardian per cabinet to share the responsibility.

If you're interested in becoming a defibrillator guardian, we'd love to hear from you.

<sup>\*</sup> Cardiopulmonary resuscitation, commonly known as CPR, is an emergency procedure that combines chest compression often with artificial ventilation in an effort to manually preserve intact brain function until further measures are taken to restore spontaneous blood circulation and breathing in a person who is in cardiac arrest.

# Investing in our community groups and schools

Did you know, West Bedlington Town Council has a Community Chest scheme which gives local voluntary groups and organisations a chance to bid for funding? This might be to help establish a new group, or to carry out extra activities that would otherwise be out of reach.

To qualify for an award, you must be able to clearly demonstrate that any funding will benefit the town and/or its residents. Applications will be considered to help with the following:

- To purchase equipment or materials, full or in part
- To purchase services, such as venue hire or transport that will enable group members to partake in trips regardless of their income
- For running costs (but not wages) of a viable group that is experiencing a period of hardship
- For the provision of recreational activities and facilities
- For activities that raise the profile of the area

This financial year, there is a budget of £3,500 for community grants and a maximum award of £500 per successful application. To apply, please visit **westbedlington.org** for an application form which you can find under The Council/Community Grants.

As well as helping with community organisations, we also have a Pupils' Fund for local primary schools to benefit from. This is available to help fund a range of improvements, whether that's for a bigger, better allotment, or an exciting new initiative that would otherwise be outside of a school's allocated budget. # New cycle link to Bedlington Station

Northumberland County Council has scooped almost £15m funding towards new cycling and walking routes for Bedlington and Tynedale, to make it easier, safer and greener for people to get around the county.

The funding was secured through the Government's Levelling Up Fund (LUF) - a multi-billion-pound scheme for eligible local authorities to invest in infrastructure that improves everyday life, including regenerating town centres, high streets and upgrading local transport.

In Bedlington, the scheme will provide a new and upgraded active travel infrastructure to improve the east to west link across the town, connecting key residential and employment areas with the planned Northumberland Line station. Additional benefits to this route include connections to schools across the town.

The project will see a new active travel path along part of Ridge Terrace, up Hazelmere Avenue, and along the existing footpath to Choppington Road. It will continue along Schalksmuhle Road to Bedlington Police Station, continue around the back of the station, then go along the edge of Gallagher Park to Rothesay Terrace. It will then meet a path that runs from St John's Road to East Sleekburn, then along Brock Lane to Cambois.

There will also be a route along part of Stead Lane, Steadland Square, and The Oval, then along an existing path to the B1331, before connecting with the railway-side cycle path and Palace Road. Some new crossings will also be installed.

Various meetings to update and listen to the good folk of Bedlington have taken place in a consultation period which ended on 5th November 2024. A petition has been submitted to the Local Area Committee. The last meeting that took place was at Bedlington Community Centre on 17th September, where concerns from some residents about tree removal and varying path widths were raised with the project lead and we hope will be adhered to.

# New data centre to drive economic growth in our region

QTS builds, owns and operates some of the most advanced and resilient facilities in the world, with more than 60 data centres in operation or under development across the United States and the Netherlands. They have stepped in following the withdrawal of the previous investor and are seeking to redevelop land at the former power station site in Cambois, near Blyth, into a data centre campus.

A data centre campus is a group of buildings that store and manage large amounts of digital data for leading companies, enterprises and government entities who rely on technology to operate and communicate. You access a data centre whenever you use your mobile phone, a credit card, the cloud, or any online activity.

Creating a data centre campus at Cambois will bring direct and indirect employment opportunities, both during the construction of the facility and its ongoing operation. There is a real opportunity to train and employ local people, leaving a lasting legacy.

The new development will protect and enhance existing habitats, promote biodiversity and provide landscaped buffer zones to create visual screening.

The proposals help to meet the aspiration of the North East Combined Authority and Northumberland County Council to drive economic growth and bring jobs and investment to the region.

# Just the ticket for Bedlington

#### The Northumberland Line project to bring back passenger trains into service between Ashington and Newcastle is due to be completed soon, with the station in Bedlington opening in 2025. This is great news for the town as it will stimulate and support economic growth, regeneration and community development.

Bedlington will be the first stop for trains leaving Ashington and will have two platforms, one for services to Ashington and one for services to Newcastle. In order to meet the expected demand for passenger services, some additional parking will available at the station, including Blue Badge spaces and Electric Vehicle (EV) charging bays. The station and car park will also include tree planting and wildlife-friendly landscaping.

As well as single trips, railcards will be available to purchase for the following prices.

### Days out just got even more accessible

Quite simply, it's an important policy, led by the community, instead of local planning departments. It defines what's important to local people to help get the right developments in the right places.

#### **Our vision**

Our Neighbourhood Plan has a clear vision; to create a sustainable and cohesive community.

By 2036, improvements will have been made to the local environment, employment opportunities, services and facilities. Communities will be well connected via sustainable transport routes to enhance employment opportunities as well as having access to more services and facilities further afield.

There will be an appreciation of the importance of the heritage of the area, which will give local communities a sense of belonging.

#### How are we going to do this?

We have four main objectives to help us to achieve our vision.

#### Quality of life

Ensuring any new development is sustainable and contributes positively to the built, historic and natural environment of the area. New developments will be managed to ensure that important green spaces are protected. As part of this, we will work with planning experts to ensure any new buildings fit in with the town's existing framework and heritage. You may hear us refer to these as 'design codes', but in essence, this is why they are put in place.

#### **Community wellbeing**

To build on the strong sense of community and recognise the diverse needs of existing and future residents. This includes supporting the provision of different types of housing that people can afford, and which meets specific needs, including those of an ageing population; ensuring the local community has access to the services and facilities they need.

#### Local economy

Supporting both existing and new employment opportunities. Protecting the vitality and viability of the town centre as an important source of local employment and services.

#### Accessibility

Promoting access to sustainable modes of transport which connect local communities to employment as well as the services and facilities they require. Ensuring that the environmental quality of the Plan area is protected by effectively managing traffic.
